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


#### Constancia-Not Your Tia Concha

Dear Negrita: The way you spelled Vera Cruz, methinks your abuelita was actually born in the towns by the same names in Indiana, Missouri, Ohio, and Pennsylvania, all named after the Gulf Coast city in Mexico. But let's say she was actually born in Mexico-in that case, you're connected to one of the proudest black traditions in the Western Hemisphere. Veracruz the state is one of two regions in Mexico with a significant population of Afro-Mexicans (the Costa Chica region spanning the states of Guerrero and Oaxaca is the other). Near Veracruz the city was the first freeman town in the America: San Lorenzo de los Negros, created after a colony of ex-slaves led by Gaspar Yanga successfully fended off conquistadors (a statue of Yanga still stands in Veracruz proper). # WITH BRANT FREEMAN

It's been universally accepted that between all of the celebrity deaths and the ugly election season, that the year 2016 sucked - but it wasn't all bad. Game of Thrones was great, the NBA Finals were epic, the NCAA Men's Basketball Championship game was an all-timer, the World Series was incredible (winner be damned) and 2016 also gave us Rogue One which was extremely bad ass (and should have been THE ONLY Star Wars preguel produced). I also finally got the robo-raptor I'd been asking for, so 2016 was pretty sick IMHO.

I think most years play out like 2016 did: a handful of icons pass away, people in positions of power say/do something that makes you question how they ended up in their position in the first place, a few new innovative ideas/inventions are embraced by consumers, there's a 70/30 ratio of terrible/ good news stories, about 8-10 scandals in college athletics (conservative estimate), terrible moments in officiating that winds up dictating games, five important characters die in Game of Thrones (very conservative), the showrunners for "The Walking Dead" screw things up and there's something around 50 DVR-worthy moments in sports. This has been the "year formula" for the past decade so don't be surprised if 2017 ends up a lot like 2016. The good news is Prince can't die again and the Cubs can't possibly win the World Series again (please let this be true).

I can't quite close the book on 2016 yet though as I have one month left to review: December. So let's get to it.

**NBA:** You know which team had the best record in December? The Houston Rockets. who went 15-2 last month. The same team which was an embarrassment to the game last season has suddenly become extremely fun to watch and a legitimate threat in the top-heavy Western Conference. When the Rockets made the conference finals two years ago, I believed them to be extremely flawed and lucky by drawing a weak Dallas team in Round One and an exhausted Clippers team

My theory proved correct, as Houston was obliterated by the eventual champion

Warriors in the West Finals, "momentum" that carried over the following season as the Rockets fired Kevin McHale 11 games into the 2015-2016 year, playing uninspired basketball all season long before being put out of their misery by the Warriors in five games in the first round.

After watching Houston sleepwalk through an entire season, I'll be honest, I thought the franchise was doomed for mediocrity for years to come: a defensively challenged roster playing in a tough conference with a lackluster leader at the helm in James Harden. Even after the hiring of Mike D'Antoni as head coach, I yawned: a has-been coach long removed from his small window of success in Phoenix who had failed in his last two stops (Knicks and Lakers). I also believed D'Antoni only exacerbated Houston's defensive issues and that this was embraced following Popovich's turn on the a marriage that was destined to fail.

Halfway through the first season of this experiment, I'm happy to admit that I was dead wrong.

The Rockets look rejuvenated this season under D'Antoni, namely Harden who had a freaking points-rebounds-assists stat line of 53-16-17 in a win over the Knicks last month. Houston's bearded superstar is a legitimate MVP candidate while off-season additions Eric Gordon and Ryan Anderson have complimented him and fit into D'Antoni's offensive scheme quite nicely. Those three players (along with Trevor Ariza) have help spearhead a three-point barrage this season: the Rockets are averaging a league-leading 15 made threes per game this season, attempting close to FORTY three-pointers per contest.

While the play of Houston's defense still leaves something to be desired (the Rockets are 24th in points allowed), they have improved on that end in several metrics and have suddenly joined the ranks of the NBA's elite.

Now, you know I can't end a monthly NBA review without discussing the Spurs who handed the Rockets one of their two December losses. It should be noted that the Spurs had quite the impressive December as well going 12-2 although the most notable moment for the Spurs last month wasn't a

game. Instead, it was the jersey retirement ceremony for the legendary Tim Duncan held on December 18 at the AT&T Center.

I watched that thing from beginning to end and was reminded of a few things. First, is what an incredible person Duncan is in addition to the once-in-a-generation player he was. Everybody Duncan allowed to get close to him (a very small group) RAVED about him as a human being. I was also reminded of the first time I ever watched him play: at a friend's house on Halloween in 1997, when I was a junior in high school. I watched him play for the last time ever this past summer as a 35-year-old man with a mortgage and a family (life comes at you fast). What also came to mind was just how tight of a bond he has with Gregg Popovich, one I don't think I've ever seen in sports. When they microphone, I'll admit it got a little misty-eyed in the Freeman household.

**NFL:** Good lord are the football gods are acting like one big tease to the Texans this season. Yes Houston, you can have a great defense and Jadaveon Clowney will live up to his draft position but you can't have JJ Watt! Yes Houston, you can have great receivers in Deandre Hopkins and Will Fuller and a nice, shiny new running back in Lamar Miller but you get to have Brock Osweiler at quarterback at the low-low price of \$72,000,000! Yes Houston, you get to play the Derek Carr-less Raiders in the playoffs but get the honor of being incinerated by the Patriots the following week! Yes Houston, you get to host the Super Bowl this season but the Dallas Cowboys might play in it!



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#### He Won?

Donald Trump is the President-elect of the United States of America. That was unexpected. It reminds me more than a little of an old Eddie Murphy bit about voting for Jesse Jackson as President and waking up the next morning to find he had won. That was, of course, the whole joke, Jesse Jackson would be President of the United States. I'm sure that more than a few people felt that way on November 9 of last year.

Now that it's January, though, it really is time to pick your jaw up from the floor and carry on. I supported Trump and even implied he could win, but nothing went as I expected either, so I don't deserve any accolades for my predictive abilities. Everyone was caught by surprise, I think, but if you haven't managed to put together why Donald Trump won the election, you simply haven't been paying attention. He won because he was the candidate the American people collectively wanted, and why they wanted him was in part evident in his opposing candidate.

So, what's next?

That's a good question. I doubt that the apocalypse is next. There seems no obvious indication that Trump will start World War III either accidentally or on purpose. Nor does it seem likely that our entire system of government will collapse. That said, I get the distinct impression from what he's done so far that business as usual is likewise out of the question. I do expect things to be interesting at least, and there are some hints at what Trump plans as long and short-term goals.

I expect that we will see him go directly after Obamacare very early on. Trump has made no secret that he intends to repeal Obamacare, and I expect that he will start tearing it apart near day one. A complete repeal would probably be cleaner, but I suspect it might be legislatively easier to remove the teeth from Obamacare and simply let it fall under its own weight. Without various mandates, Obamacare

that he wants to keep certain elements and have some sort of replacement for Obamacare. That will be easier to do as a large chunk used to replace what remains of an otherwise toothless piece of history.

Trump's cabinet is extremely military neavy at the moment, and I suspect this indicates a substantial change in our policy towards terrorism. I don't expect Trump to have much difficulty getting these picks through, and I think he will use the first excuse he can find to go aggressively after some large-scale terror target. The target may even be someplace other than where we have been fighting terror, but the idea will be to show a stark difference in our tolerance for terror operations. Mind you, Trump has shown an amazing ability to come up with nnovative solutions, and I can't help but think he will do so here as well.

After these three things, I think that a Trump administration will be facing a long war on several fronts. I have no idea how any of these will ultimately turn out.

First, Trump will be anxious to appoint his Supreme court pick, and that should mark the beginning of a fight with Democrats that may not end at any point in his first term. Trump will not be able to push through his choice on his own, so he will need to either make some concessions on his choice or get support from Republicans

becomes just a suggestion. Trump has said in the Senate. He will not want to do the former and may not be able to get the latter. My guess is that he will use this as a chance to test using the bully pulpit of the presidency. He may feel he can get the people to put pressure on the Senate. He may be right.

> Second will be an ongoing battle with the press. Trump has already indicated he will not take criticism from the press quietly, and the press has indicated that it intends to be partisan to the end. These two attitudes will not be able to coexist peacefully; someone will have to blink. In the end, the loser will be the one who has the least credibility with the general public, and for the moment, that actually appears to be the press. We may find ourselves getting our information directly from the Trump administration without a filter at all.

> The third, and last, ongoing battle I see will be between Trump and the bureaucracy in Washington. Most of our government is not elected, and many have levels of job safety that make them all but untouchable. Most of these people are studiously liberal, and almost all of them are have a vested interest in the status quo. This will make them instant enemies of the Trump administration. We have already seen under the Obama administration that many government agencies do exactly as they please and ignore oversight from congress. They can likely do the same to the executive branch. I've already seen several very inventive solutions to this presented, but I imagine that Trump, whose life has been an exercise in contract negotiation, will have some plans of his own.

> By next column, some of this will probably be more in the works. I will be looking forward to how thing will shake out in the first few months of a Trump administration.
