Last Word

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#### Elections. Hooray.

With the number of times we hit the polls at the local level, one might think that the people running them would have the process down cold. One might think that the relatively simple task of collecting and counting votes could be executed without error, much in the same way that hamburgers are flipped

and City Hall loses appeals. One would be wrong.

In a move that is cause for mild alarm considering what its charge is, the New Braunfels Independent School District managed to screw up the mail-in ballots for their May 7 election, requiring a reprint, a do-over and a re-deliver in hopes of getting the election right.

The text on the incorrect ballots for the Member-at-Large race read "Vote for none or one" when they should have read "Vote for none, one or two". The second-choice candidate, whomever that might be, got the short end of that stick.

The mistake is expected to affect the seven voters that had a preference in, or even knowledge of, the Member-at-Large election.

### Run Off: Miller vs Biedermann

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




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

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# Due Process

#### Update: Rathbun vs Scientology

Monique Rathbun's lawsuit against the Church of Scientology, which has been covered extensively in the TX Citizen, has garnered international attention and was also featured in the HBO documentary "Going Clear: Scientology and the Prison of Belief."

Now it's all but over.

In a surprise move, Monique Rathbun has asked the Texas Supreme Court to lift a stay in the case so that she can have her lawsuit dismissed. Currently, the Church of Scientology International has an appeal before the justices on its claims the lawsuit violates its First Amendment rights, thus the case cannot move forward in Comal County until that issue is rectified. Rathbun wants the Supreme Court to allow her case to return temporarily to Judge Dib Waldrip's court so she can move for dismissal.

Rathbun recently dismissed her successful legal team and then requested the lift of stay after the Supreme Court asked her for a response to CSI's brief.

Rathbun was suing CSI for what she says was a sustained period of harassment and surveillance. The Church admits to sending its personnel to confront and spy on Rathbun and her husband, Marty Rathbun. However, CSI argues that the actions were taken against Marty Rathbun for criticizing leader David Miscavige and for offering Scientology services outside the Church. Marty Rathbun was once the second highest-ranking member of the Church and has accused Miscavige of physical abuse of Church employees.

CSI is seeking to dismiss Monique's suit, claiming that it violates the Church's First Amendment rights. The Church utilized the Texas Citizens Participation, which was intended to protect people from being silenced by larger, more powerful entities.

In April, 2014, District Judge Dib Waldrip rejected the Church's Anti-SLAPP motion (which falls under the Texas Citizen's Participation Act) on the grounds that the lawsuit is not "based on, relates to, or is in response to" the Church's exercise of its First Amendment rights. A year later, the Third Court of Appeals concurred, thus leading to CSI's appeal to the Supreme Court.

Since no attorney's name appears on Monique's call for the lift of stay, it is more than likely that her motion was written by husband, Marty.

Strangely, the motion spends a great deal of time criticizing her former legal team. For what, exactly, is unclear but it seems that Rathbun is criticizing the team because their Third Court victory was appealed.

"The defects in the complaint that Petitioners seized upon to create inordinate delay in this case were included by former counsel over my strong objections," the motion reads. "As pled by former counsel the operative complaint serves as fodder for considerable future motion and appellate practice for scientology [sic] lawyers, as it has so served to date. I do not have the resources, the time, nor the motivation to litigate in the Supreme Court of Texas against scientology's [sic] army of lawyers in the defense of errors made by attorneys who subordinated my wishes in favor of interests inimical to my own."

This was a strange contention, especially since Marty Rathbun once oversaw the Church's legal operations and knows the Church's legal modus operandi is to wear opponents down through endless appeals.

The Rathbun motion also makes the claim that the fired legal team was in "retreat," despite the two major victories in Waldrip's court and Appeals.

"While performing their retreat strategy from this lawsuit my former lawyers made two things abundantly clear to me: a) my lawsuit is not worth it financially for former counsel or anyone to continue to litigate, and b) my husband and I have effectively achieved the primary purpose that the lawsuit was originally intended to serve by our own independent efforts."

After the cased is dismissed, Monique Rathbun will lose the injunction against Church members, which was intended to protect her from harassment during the duration of the case.

Whether Monique Rathbun and the Church have reached a settlement is not known.

#### More Trouble for Paxton

The Great State's Attorney General and multiple felony indictee Ken Paxton got caught lying to a Tarrant County Tea Party group recently, telling it that he's been audited by the IRS and had his bank accounts frozen because of the three state indictments for fraud and the Federal charge he's facing for financial shenanigans we've covered in-depth on the Texas Newsgrinder podcast (subscribe in the iTunes podcast store or find it at txcitizen.com).

He described himself as someone you might have known as a good neighbor for some time, but that after your hypothetical pal takes a new job, "Suddenly, this neighbor is in all kinds of trouble. He is being investigated by the IRS... some of his bank accounts are shut down. Some of his retirement accounts are being shut down. You find out the guy in being investigated by the Travis County DA, then the Dallas County DA, then the Collin County DA. And then you find out he is being investigated by the SEC."

When questioned on that statement, Paxton's attorney was quick to point out that while Pastor Ken has been charged by the Travis, Dallas and Collin County DA's, along with the SEC, that the AG didn't say that he was audited by the IRS, and used the following Paxton quote to back that up: "I have no speeding ticket in my life. Never been audited by the IRS. Never

been investigated by—never, no bar grievances with the state bar. I get sworn into office and everything I just mentioned happened." Which means exactly the opposite of what Paxton's lawyer claims it does, plus, now we know Paxton has gotten a speeding ticket sometime in the last 15 months or so, or at least he's claiming he did. That's what "everything I just mentioned happened" means.

But lying to a special-interest group to make yourself look like the subject of political persecution isn't a crime, and therefore isn't this week's actual story about Paxton, it's just a fun thing to bring up to illustrate how even lawyers that aren't employed by New Braunfels City Hall will stand outside at noon and claim it's midnight, and to provide a glimpse into the AG's character. No, the real Paxton story this week is that the Great State's Attorney General has continued to use taxpayer dollars to pay staff members that no longer work in his office.

Paxton's former communications director, Allison Castle, left the employ of the state on March 9, but she's still hauling in her nearly \$13,000 per month salary. Castle says that's the deal she was offered when Paxton asked her to resign and that she didn't request it.

Assistant Attorney General Charles "Chip" Roy resigned to go run a Ted Cruz Super Pac and said he was on paid leave of absence until June, even though state law doesn't allow him to do that. He's still collecting \$16,000 per month from the taxpayers of the great state, and why shouldn't he? When you work for Ken Paxton and Ted Cruz, you're doing nothing short of the Lord's work. (Look for Chip to attempt to return to Paxton full-time now that Cruz has terminated his non-viable candidacy.)

It shouldn't surprise anyone that this is going down, as it's clear that Paxton doesn't consider state employment rules to be something he's subject to. After all, both Castle and Roy were hired by Paxton without those job openings publicly advertised, as required by law - and the fact that neither of them had any government experience was apparently irrelevant as well.

Keith Pevoto is seriously ill, paralyzed from the waist down and has lost his sight.

I wanted to get that out of the way because this article is not about Keith's physical condition, but about his mental and creative acuity, which is who he truly is. If you were expecting a tender sob piece that could be read aloud while "Wind Beneath My Wings" plays in the background, forget it. That would do Keith a great disservice.

Henry David Thoreau wrote of how most of us "lead lives of quiet desperation." I can't speak for the "mass of men," but I certainly understand how many of us exist in a near-constant state of anxiety in a world that make us want to bang our heads against walls and scream for relief from unnamed gods. This is what, I guess, William S. Burroughs meant by "The Fear."\*

I didn't ask Keith about "The Fear." This is due to two reasons: First, it would be a creepy thing to ask a person. Second, and more importantly, when you speak with Keith, such a thing doesn't even enter your mind. This is because every cell in Keith's being radiates excitement about music.

Formerly a surveyor, Keith felt he needed someway to satiate his drive. As artists do in times of crisis, he threw himself into his art. The former bass/guitar player said he lost some of the coordination in his right arm and hand, but love for the craft never left him.

"I wanted to find a way to redefine myself and try to get back into music somehow," he said. "This past summer, I was in the hospital, just sitting there. I began creating some lyrics and music, and it was like the floodgates opened."

Keith wrote a song called "Secret

Garden" about Oma Gruene's Secret Garten and the Gruene Room Studio there. Everything changed for him.

"I felt that I had found my calling," he said. Keith began culling together a Who's Who of local musicians, including Monty "Guitar" Tyler, Ace Pepper and Jamie Krueger to help him create and record. With the help of his colleagues and Gruene Room Studiomeister Gray LeGere, Keith is recording an album, also titled "Secret Garden," which should be completed soon.

Monty Tyler co-wrote the song "Roam" with Keith. Recorded by Monty, "Roam" is a bristling blues shuffle that is peppy and danceable. The song represents Keith's new search for self definition:

"I'd stay tonight -

Oh, darling -

But the road keeps calling me home;

I've got to roam, roam, roam,

Until I find my soul."

Monty said he was very impressed by Keith and has enjoyed working with him.

"He has more drive than anyone I have ever met," Monty said. "It is just incredible what he can do with no sight. He created a file system in Dropbox with all songs and lyrics he has written, and has sample files with what he is thinking about writing, and if I do some music for him, I put it in another file. So each song – and there are about 20 songs now – has three separate folders. I don't know if I ever could set up something like that."

For Keith, music is more than a craft - it's also a way to rise above whatever is going on in his life.

paid for," Keith said. "In my situation, it's been my getaway. That's really what 'Secret Garden' is about: finding your getaway. Music is there help everyone get out from the hustle and bustle, the rants and raves around us."

Keith, then, isn't leading a "life of quiet desperation." His is one of sound and his desperation is to create.

"By creating music, I can separate myself from whatever is going on and follow wherever the song goes, an avenue to get away," he said.

Keith said his compositions are about whatever he feels at the moment and sound however the mood strikes him. He doesn't want to box himself in by keeping to one genre. "Where's the creativity in that?", he said.

All he wants, really, is for people to listen and, hopefully, enjoy his work. And he doesn't want the "Wind Beneath My Wings" treatment.

"When someone looks at my situation, I don't want them to feel sorry for me because everybody has hurdles in their lives," Keith said. "If you can find motivation, inspiration and have perseverance, anything is possible. I just hope people can get something out of the music and not throw tomatoes at me."

I never thought I would place the words "freaking cool" and "brooms" in the same sentence. But, here we are.

While visiting the recent Folkfest at Heritage Village here in New Braunfels, I met John Potter from Zorn. John, if you haven't guessed already, makes brooms. These aren't the brooms that you buy at the store, but are handmade and entirely different.

"The techniques I use are late 1700s to early 1800s," he said. "Some of these handles were made from the root of the trees, so each one is unique. Because of that, some of them will have a completely weird character."

He's not kidding. Some of the brooms were odd looking but really freaking cool (there it is). The brooms can be used for display, to magic something and, yes, to use for sweeping. John said his brooms are guaranteed to last eight years under normal use. The reason, he said, is because of the weave.

"I use broom corn, which is a sweet sorghum," John said. "The modern broom uses only the bristles, so even though they wrap it tightly with wire, if one bristle falls out, the one next to it falls out. We use the whole stock, so if one bristle falls out, the rest stay attached."

The reason I mentioned brooms is because this is just one of surprises found at the Folkfest. There was a lot to see and do, and a family could really use a couple of days to view everything.

The Folkfest is so unique to this area, there is nothing else quite like it" said Clarisa DeSanto, an events promoter who helped put on the Fest. "We can't offer that tangible handson experience in schools. Here, the children are able see, feel and play.

Children certainly enjoyed the period-styled toys at the Buffalo Soldiers exhibit.

Horace Williams, of Austin, has been portraying a Buffalo Soldier for 26 years. He said he became fascinated after reading some historical works on the subject. African-American soldiers were called Buffalo Soliders beginning shortly after the Civil War. Horace said the name stuck until the Army was integrated in 1947. His group represents the Buffalo Soldiers from 1866-98.

"Some came into the Army to help make

the United States what it is today," he said. "Some came in to get an education, and some came in just to wear this blue uniform with these pretty gold buttons."

Besides participating in the fight over Westward expansion, Horace said the Buffalo soldiers had many roles.

"They also acted as police in Texas," he said. "Texas was a safe haven, so there were a lot of outlaws. The Buffalo Soldiers also guarded the railroads as they were being built."

For those who are interested in antique firearms, there were many to see, from the Buffalo Soldiers exhibit, to Chuck Jones' and Stuart Vickers' array of pistols, and at the Sons of Confederate Veterans exhibit. And there was the periodic cannon firing.

Another one of my favorite stops was Donny Demoin's chuck wagon to drink some coffee and bolt down biscuits. Donny said there is a difference between the chuck wagon and simply cooking out.

"I think it makes you feel better and the food just tastes better on this black iron," he said.

Donny uses period cookware. His coffee pot, for example, is more than 100 years old. And since he does it the old-fashioned way, it takes about two hours to get everything going.

I also sawed a log at the Lumberjack Challenge with the help of Kade Anderson and Mackenzie Nichols. (Kade said the secret was to not force it. He was right.)

Clarisa said this year's event was hugely successful and example of many people and organizations coming together.

"We did amazing," she said. "We more than tripled attendance and everybody was very pleased. I think my favorite part was to see the families who came both days."

Clarisa said one of things she and the Heritage Society would like to see is an infusion of younger members.

"Part of this year's event was to really encourage membership," she said. "We want younger members, especially since the town is growing, particularly among the 25-55 age group. We really need younger people to step up and volunteer with these







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#### On Props for Teachers

As I write this column it's National Teachers Appreciation Day. In the libertarian world I envision, school would be a private affair, but that doesn't mean that I don't appreciate teachers. In fact, even in the public school system, most teachers are underappreciated. They are expected to perform miracles with few resources and no help, and they are the first group to be vilified if something goes wrong. The following are just a few of the things our teachers deserve appreciation for:

• Teachers generally work far more hours than people credit them with. It's true that teachers have summers and many holidays off from school, but even though your kid may be playing outside, her teacher may not be. Grading, planning lessons, furthering their education, and attending endless meetings are all things your average teacher spends an incredible amount of time on.

So, when you break out a calculator to figure out the hourly wage of a teacher and compare it to someone who runs a daycare or babysits, try to factor those hours in too.

• Teachers aren't just day care workers or babysitters. In addition to accepting that teachers work more hours than the average person thinks, it would be nice if people remembered the level of qualifications most teachers have. Here, the public school system can claim a level of superiority over the private one. Public schools have high standards for teachers, and with very few exceptions, teachers from kindergarten to high school have a degree. Even more importantly (and it pains me to say this), the degrees generally make a good deal of sense. Elementary and middle school teachers have education degrees heavily stacked with psychology and pedagogy, and high school teachers have degrees in their field of expertise along with many education courses.

The point of all this is that teachers are highly trained professionals. They are rarely treated as such.

- Teachers have everyone from the federal government to the parent looking over their shoulder as they work. The only other occupation that I imagine deals with this extent of "back-seat driving" is a police officer (and they're underappreciated too). Teachers deal with a level of bureaucracy that no one should have to deal with, and every level of that bureaucracy seems intent on placing more and more responsibility on teachers' shoulders. Teachers deal with federal, state, and local governments; superintendents, principles, and department heads; parents, advocates, and social workers, and none of them ever seem happy.
- Teachers deal with kids, and kids today are brats. Oh I know some of you are saying, "not my Johnny/Jane." Yes, them too. Unless your raised your child in a secluded compound far from the rest of society, your kid's a pain in the ass too. They may be a dream in comparison to others, but in all likelihood they are a messy, whiny, know-it-all with their face plastered to a cellphone and the attention span of a goldfish.

Admit it, you know what they're like. That's why you breathe a sigh of relief every day when you pack them off to school.


• Teachers are students for their whole careers. Most of us think fondly of the point we got out of school. Teachers never get that feeling because they never do get out of school, and not just because they work there. Not only are teachers highly qualified, but they're also expected to stay that way. Most teachers continue to take classes and continue to be tested for competency as a matter of course. Maintaining a teaching license, in most cases, requires a continued dedication to self-improvement. That means more than simply trying to get better at your job every year. It usually means seeking out the latest methods and ideas and incorporating them into classroom teaching. Imagine being forced to learn a new way

to do your job all the time. Most of us have some experience with this, either for some new thing we're forced to do in our jobs, or because our job changes at some point. Remember, this is the nature of teaching and not an occasional curveball.

• Teachers actually care. It may be hard to believe, but most teachers really do care. They care about their students. They care about the system. They care about the job they do. Most people assume that teachers send the kids home after the last bell, and that's the end of it. It really isn't. It would be if they didn't care, but most of them do. They may be the one thing that isn't broken, so try to give them a break and say thanks when you can.
