Hey, you going to breathe that?

If you paid any attention to local media outside of your TX Citizen and Texas Newsgrinder over the past week, (and nobody can blame you

if you haven't), you've no doubt been subject to the Chamber of Commerce/4-B/City Hall/HZ hype over Canadian General Tower's acceptance of a \$2 million dollar bribe grant from the State, \$1.1 million in local tax dollars, and some hefty County tax incentives in order to move here. It's just the greatest thing ever.

Governor and tree-antagonist Greg Abbott is making a very big deal about this, issuing an in-your-face statement to the rest of the Union, some members of which were trying to get CGT to build within their state's confines:

"Thanks to our skilled workforce, lowtax and low-regulation climate, Texas will continue to attract industry leaders like CGT. By choosing Texas as the location to reshore part of their manufacturing efforts, we are proving that when given the opportunity, the Lone Star State can compete and win against any economy in the world."

Sure. Texas and New Braunfels "won" in the same way a buyer at an auction "wins" – by paying more than anybody else thinks is reasonable. Congratulations. But there's one part of Abbott's first sentence there that's given us pause. Let's see. Skilled workforce. Check. Low taxes. Check. Low-regulation climate*. Ch... uh-oh.

Yeah. According to Canadian television network CTV, Canadian government data declared CGT the fifth largest polluter in the Waterloo region of Canada in 2009. That CTV report was issued in 2011.

CGT was one of three of the top-ten polluters that chose not to respond to the

network's questions about their emissions. It's important to note that CGT was within legal guidelines for output of pollutants, so we're not talking criminals like so many other businesses that have been

lured to town with public money, just a heavy emitter. When considering City Hall's track record of whom they pay off to come here, maybe polluters are preferable to criminals. Maybe.

Also important is that the tree-huggers down in the Guada-Coma neighborhood that were sooooo concerned with local environmental quality during the disposable-container ban fight had nothing to say about this. Keep that in mind the next time you hear somebody screaming about "ecology" and "stewardship" and "quality of life". Anyway, mind the air as CGT builds its factory out behind the Walmart Distribution Center. Maybe breathe a little less deeply when you're in that part of town. just providing a tube, much like there is more to skydiving than strapping on a backpack.

While the tube is the most obviously necessary instrument, there are a variety of things essential for the erstwhile tuber, none of which are more important than an allaround enjoyable experience.

Comal Tubes, says he wants to "make the customer the king," he means it earnestly will beat that drum. I'm not having it." and without irony.

Bolstad, who helped the original owner start the company, took over Comal Tubes a few months ago.

"There are some changes implementing, but most of those are customer-service oriented with a lot more focus on New Braunfels residents," he said. "We want to be more engaged and not have the mentality that we're doing the customer a favor by simply being here."

In a sense, Bolstad has retro-vision when in comes to customer service. He wants those who visit Comal Tubes to experience a time when the "customer as king" was ingrained into the business psyche. Those old enough can remember a time when service stations actually serviced the car, hotels and campgrounds offered numerous amenities, and the good people at Stuckey's were very happy to sell you pecans.

If you are not old enough to remember such a customer-first mentality, you have sincerely missed out and Bolstad wants to reinitiate that experience.

"When you drive up, you're going to get the bro service, such as 'Hey, Bro! Glad you made it,'" he said. "People are buying season passes right now and I'm responding to each and every one of them by email, thanking them for buying a season pass, letting them know how stoked we are to see them this summer."

To create that experience, Bolstad and his staff want to begin providing service the minute the customer pulls into the parking lot, to the minute they pull out. The outfitter

Another main objective for Bolstad is to make sure that his shuttle buses are continuously running, so tubers are not waiting too long to be dropped off or picked up.

"After dropping customers off, the buses will immediately drive to the pick up area and if anyone is waiting there, will provide what the customers need, help up," he said. "You're also going to need those customers will be immediately picked

up," he said. "We want to have a sense of urgency in picking people up. Buses aren't cheap, but by purchasing more buses you're not just making an investment in the business, but also in the customer."

And there is, of course, the allimportant tube. If you try to go down the river without a tube, river rescue teams will have to launch their boats, making least Guada-Coma neighborhood resident nervous.

Outfitters spend a great deal of time surrounded by tubes, the all-important alpha and omega to all that is tubing. Comal Tubes has about 1,000 tubes, which can mean days of tube maintenance.

"Right now, I have a trailer that has 40 tubes and I don't know if they have holes in them, or if someone just let the air out," Bolstad said. "I will have to get out the compressor and blow up each one. If the tube is patchable, great. If not, it will have to be recycled."

Then, of course, there is the Mysterious Return of the Missing Tubes.

"You'll have some days when 15 people come back on the bus, but there are only 12 tubes," Bolstad said. "But, at some point, all of the tubes show back up. It's a phenomenon, as if each has their own beacon device that leads them back home."

The tubing season officially begins at spring break and lasts about five months but, as Bolstad notes, "we'll probably start ramping things up about a month-and-ahalf before then. Even now, I'm making sure all my technical and legal stuff is taken care of."

Comal Tubes is located at 1880 Elliot Knox, close to the freeway (they were previously located on Seguin Avenue, but moved to have more space). The company is the closest outfitter to I-35, right off of Walnut Avenue. 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

Campylobacteriosis Up, Syphilis Holds Steady

Comal County residents got a break from the more virulent form of flu in 2015, but did suffer an uptick in food-born illnesses.

Cases of Influenza Type A dropped last year. Influenza Type A, also known as avian flu, fell from 1,386 reported cases in 2014 to 795. Both years represent a significant drop from 2013, when Comal had 1,853 known cases. Influenza A is often responsible for flu pandemics. The virus is called avian flu because wild birds act as hosts for the virus.

Also falling were flu-like illnesses, which dropped to only 142 reported cases last year from 437 cases in 2014 and 496 in 2013.

However, there was an increase in reported cases of Influenza Type B, a less virulent form not generally associated with pandemics. Type B cases rose to 435 from 106 the year before.

"We have not really had that many cases of flu - as of yet," said Health Director Gwen Mills. "Some years, it will start earlier in December and January, but some years the peak months can be February and March. The important thing is that it is not too late to get your flu shot."

Mills did note there will be some corrections to the county illness report, but those corrections will not affect the influenza numbers.

Streptococcal infections remained steady in the county at 23, down one from 2014. There were only 11 cases in 2013. Streptococcal is a bacterial illness and primarily has two forms. Type A is more commonly known as strep throat, but can lead to scarlet fever and, in the worst case scenario, a flesh eating disease. Type B mostly affects newborns, causing pneumonia and meningitis. Streptococcus can be treated with antibiotics.

Eating food was a bit more dicey for Comal residents, who saw increases across the board in diseases caused by tainted food. Cases of Shigellosis rose from 15 cases in 2014 to 31 last year. Salmonella cases increased to 49 from 31 in 2014. There were 22 reported cases of campylobacteriosis in 2015, more than triple the seven cases the year before. There were also two reported

cases of E. Coli, whereas there were none in 2014. All of the 2015 food-born illnesses represent an increase over 2013, as well.

Most food-born illnesses are caused by bacterial contamination, which come from a variety of nasty things. As of August 2015, there was an increase in food recalls nationwide, the most famous of which was Blue Bell ice cream due to listeria contamination. There were no reported listeria cases in Comal County.

Despite warnings last year in the TX Citizen and other public service announcements, some sexually active people within the county were still not taking precautions as sexually transmitted diseases remained relatively high.

The most common STD in Comal remains Chlamydia, which did have a slight drop in 2015. There were 203 cases of the disease in 2015, down from 221 in 2014 and 220 the year before that. Chlamydia is more damaging to women.

Also barely dropping were reported cases of gonorrhea, from 35 in 2014 to 32 last year. That number is still higher than 2013, which saw 27 cases of the disease. The number of syphilis reports remained the same, at six. There were no cases of syphilis reported in 2013.

The health department finds those high numbers worrying.

"This is an area where we and the regional health department are very concerned," Mills said. "We are always looking at ways we can cut down on those cases and their transmission."

AIDS is still rare in Comal County, as there were no reported cases of the disease for the second year in a row (there was only one case in 2013). As well, there were only two reported incidents of human immunedeficiency virus (HIV) last year. There was only one incident in 2014 and three in 2013.

Strangely, there were six cases of tuberculosis reported last year. This is the highest number of reported TB cases in the county at least since 1994, the earliest year of reportable illnesses available on the County's website.

On the bright side, there continues to be no reported cases of Ebola or the plague in Comal County.

Both of my grandparents were part of the bracero program and I was wondering: what is the agency or institution where they hold the list of names of Mexicans who were part of the program? I would greatly appreciate it.

Dear Jalisco Never Backs Down: Your abuelitos were braceros? One of mine was, too, along with a chingo of uncles, one who ended up picking beets in Michigan-fun! And just to remind the gabas who braceros were: they were the original guest-workers between the United States and Mexico, originally set up during World War II so that our fighting men could go kill commie Nazis. Originally an executive order signed by FDR, the bracero program continued until the mid-1960s. After waiting far too long, I've finally seen the new Star Wars movie. A spoiler or two did leak through before I made it to the theater, but I still enjoyed it immensely. I'm part of that generation who really did grow up on Star Wars, and though the magic is a bit diminished with my years, I think I'll always be excited by the franchise. I even went out and saw it a second time in a small local theater, and it was during this showing that it occurred to me that Star Wars (and its universe) is actually quite conservative in its message. (You can feel free to read on. All the arguments I'll make will be general ones. You'll get no spoilers from me.)

The first instance of conservative values is one I've seen used to describe Star Wars as libertarian, but it works for conservatives too: Star Wars is clearly dedicated to the idea of capitalism. This affinity isn't slavish; it shows many warts, there are thieves, cheats and smugglers aplenty, but everyone is trying to better their life through commerce. We're not forced, as we are in the Star Trek universe, to accept as heroes a group that has managed to transcend the crudity of capitalism and money. In Star Wars, capitalism is a simple reality, unquestioned. (I like to assume that in such an advanced society, communism has been left on the ash heap of history for good.)

It might be easy to question the Republican Party's commitment capitalism. If they're less interested in a state controlled economy than Democrats, the difference is one of degree, but

There is no question that for the Star Wars universe things were better before the rise of the Empire. In the real world, we might need to debate just how swell the fifties were.

Probably the most interesting thing to me about this exercise is that is seems beyond question, that the people involved in the creation of Star Wars didn't intend for this to be the case. George Lucas isn't very conservative, and I doubt J.J Abrams is any more so. Quite the opposite seems probable. Even so, the story that they tell is a conservative one. I suspect that some of this has to do with the basic nature of storytelling. I think that the best stories are sometimes the ones that aren't contrived to create a message but are drawn from deep inside the author's nature and perhaps the nature of all of us. Of course, that's an argument for another time.
